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

## Sermon Discussion

This letter is probably the most well-known letter in Revelation and it is full of rebuke. Jesus' words in these verses are quite strong and corrective. How have you generally approached rebuking someone? How do you generally respond to correction or rebuke in your own life, particularly when it comes from God through Scripture or other means?

Laodicea was a wealthy community. The materialism of the city had rubbed off on the church, with disastrous results. We live in relatively wealthy communities. How do we resist adopting the same practices as our community as the Laodiceans did?

The Laodiceans' self-confidence about their wealth was really a self-sufficiency that arose from dependence on earthly security. Verse 17 describes the Laodiceans as saying, "I am rich; I have acquired wealth and do not need a thing." How might this attitude be subtly present in your own life, even if you don't express it in the same way? In what ways do any of our earthly securities lead us to a self-sufficiency that excludes dependence on God?

Jesus critiques the Laodiceans for being "lukewarm." What are some signs that a Christian today might be spiritually "lukewarm"? Becoming lukewarm seems to happen gradually, then suddenly. How does this manifest in your own spiritual practices or lack thereof? What is the way out of spiritual dullness (verses 19, 22)?

When we fail to repent, we feel like the Psalmist: "For when I kept silent, my bones wasted away through my groaning all day long. For day and night your hand was heavy upon me; my strength was dried up as by the heat of summer" (Psalm 32). How does being stuck in lukewarm faith crush us if we fail to repent? If we grow so numb that we don't feel the need to repent, what is the way out?

Jesus wants the Laodiceans to be hot or cold (ie. spiritually refreshing). Can you think of ways our church has been spiritually refreshing to each other?
